Additional Reports:

In support of the Judicial Branch's strategic agenda, the Supreme Court/Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) provided the following domestic violence services in State Fiscal Year 2022/2023: Court policy analysts to support various committees addressing issues of domestic violence in the courts; automation trainers dedicated to teaching court staff domestic violence case processing; and computer programmers committed to make necessary updates or enhancements to the statewide case management system, the Arizona Protective Order Initiation & Notification Tool and the AOC's public access portal. Additionally, funds were used to develop and provide domestic violence education for judges and court staff at judicial branch training offerings as well as the other multidisciplinary domestic violence conferences. These services are addressed by multiple divisions at the AOC.

The Office of the Attorney General distributed \$1,780,000 for state mandated services for victims of crime. The Office of the Attorney General also indicated that there is no way to identify the amount of these funds used to support victims of domestic violence.
