OIFA Member Newsletter - March 2022 Parents As Paid Caregivers for Minor Children

AHCCCS received temporary authority from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) to permit parents to be paid caregivers of minor children under a special waiver during the COVID-19 public health emergency (PHE). This flexibility was scheduled to end at the conclusion of the PHE. AHCCCS will be temporarily extending this flexibility through March 31, 2024, as part of its American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) spending plan.

At the end of the PHE the program will be the same with the addition of a new requirement. Parents will not be able to exceed 40 hours of paid care in a given week. This applies to all parents, even those employed by multiple agencies. AHCCCS will post a frequently asked questions document on their website specific to this flexibility in the coming weeks.

Article Revision Informal Public Comment

The Department of Economic Security (Department) is in the process of rewriting multiple Articles that are part of Title 6 of the Arizona Administrative Code (A.A.C.) Chapter 6. These are the administrative rules that direct many Division activities. The Department is seeking informal input as these rules are drafted. This will ensure stakeholders' comments and concerns are considered early in the rule writing process. Current Articles available for informal public comment are:

- Article 10 public comments will be accepted through March 21, 2022
- Article 15 public comments will be accepted through March 21, 2022
- Articles 1, 6, 8, 12, 13, 16, 22 and 23 public comments will be accepted through March 25,
 2022

There will be a formal public comment period after the rules are published in the Arizona Administrative Register.

COVID-19 Update

Arizona continues to be impacted by positive COVID-19 cases.

Arizonans 5 years of age and older can receive the Pfizer vaccine. Arizonans 18 years of age and older can receive the Pfizer, Moderna, or Johnson & Johnson vaccine. COVID-19 vaccines are safe, highly effective and available at no cost.

Mask Guidance

On Friday, February 25, 2022, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) updated its guidance on when to wear a mask. They have developed an online tool to show the guidance based on the county based on the level of COVID-19 in the community. This tool can be found on the CDC website as well as on the DDD Actions Related to COVID-19 webpage.

Booster Shots

The CDC recommends booster shots for:

- Anyone who received a second dose of either Pfizer or Moderna at least five months ago.
- Anyone who received the Johnson & Johnson vaccine at least two months ago.

The Moderna and Pfizer mRNA vaccine boosters are preferred even if an individual received the Johnson & Johnson vaccine initially. However, the Johnson & Johnson booster is available if that is the person's preference.

How to Get the Vaccine

The vaccines are as widely available and as easily accessible as possible. Vaccines are available at pharmacies, doctor's offices and other locations run by county health departments. You can find a vaccine site near you online at https://www.azdhs.gov/findvaccine or by calling 1-844-542-8201. You can text your zip code to 438829, for English, or 822862, for Spanish, to receive a text message with details about three locations near you with vaccine availability.

How to Get Tested

Testing is available to anyone who thinks they may have COVID-19. A testing location near you can be found online at https://www.azdhs.gov/covid19/index.php#everyone-get-tested. The federal government has also made at-home tests available at no cost. These can be ordered by visiting https://www.covidtests.gov/.

Eligible Medicaid members can get non-emergency medical transportation (NEMT) to their vaccine appointment. Contact your <u>health insurance provider</u> for more details. You can also find facts and myths about the COVID-19 vaccine on the <u>Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)</u> website. Virtual Planning Meetings for Members Eligible for ALTCS

Beginning April 1, 2022, person-centered service planning meetings can be held in-person for members eligible for the Arizona Long Term Care System (ALTCS) if the member chooses that option. This means members and their families can select to have their person-centered service planning meeting in person, rather than virtually. Members can tell their Support Coordinator at their next planning meeting if they would like to have their next meeting in-person.


Virtual person-centered service plan meetings will continue to be an option for members and families who prefer not to meet in person. The person-centered service planning process focuses on what is best for the member. This change allows members to choose the meeting type that best fits their needs.
