Arizona Child Care Recovery Plan

In response to the \$1.3 billion in relief funding, the Division of Child Care partnered with Arizona's early childhood care and education community to launch the **Arizona Child Care Recovery Plan** – more than 30 initiatives across 4 strategic areas through September 2024:

- **Expand Access to Care**
- **Invest in Quality Systems**
- **Accelerate Educational Support and Early Childhood Literacy**
- **Stabilize the Child Care Network**

Arizona Child Care Recovery Plan

\$338.0 Million	Expand Access to Care	Ensure access to quality child care for low-income working families by providing financial stabilization to support and maintain Arizona's child care network while supporting growth and sustainability.
\$150.6 Million	Invest in Quality Systems	In order to adequately address the current instability of the child care industry and ensure Arizona's families have access to quality child care settings that will best support them and their children, providers must have supports that ensure continued operation and simultaneously address other inequities in the system.
\$90.7 Million	Accelerate Educational Support and Early Childhood Literacy	Support parents in need of child care who are seeking to increase skills to move toward greater self-sufficiency and higher income jobs; and increase the knowledge of early childhood educators and families to strengthen and sustain effective teaching and early childhood literacy practices in communities.

- Ordering and distributing critical, hard-to-obtain supplies to child care providers.

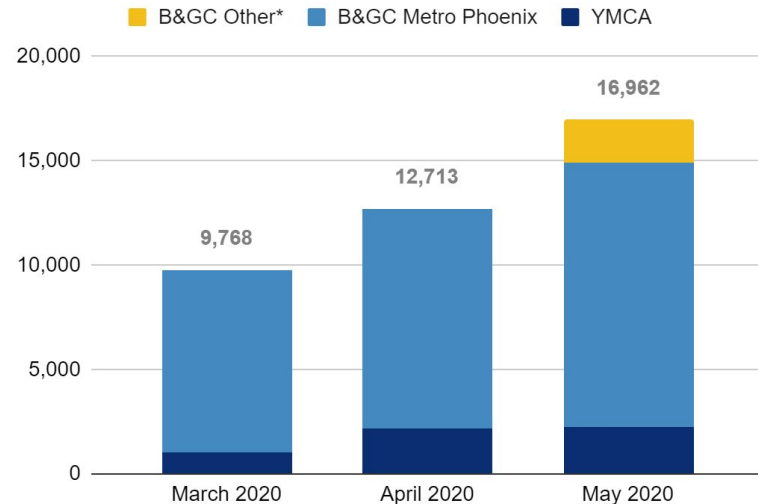

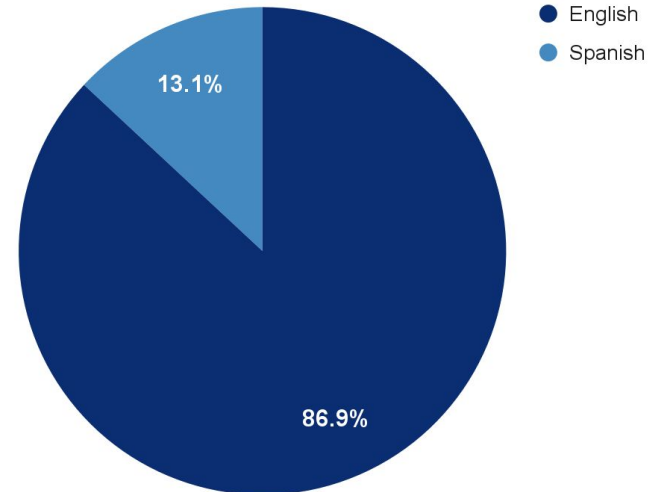

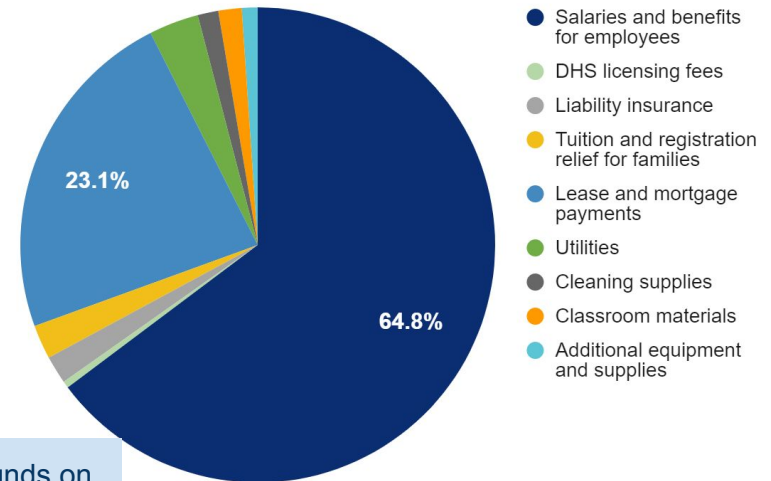

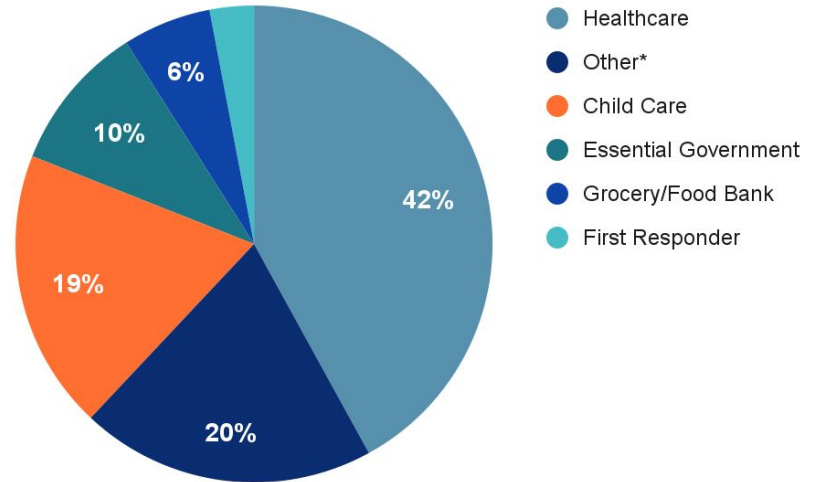

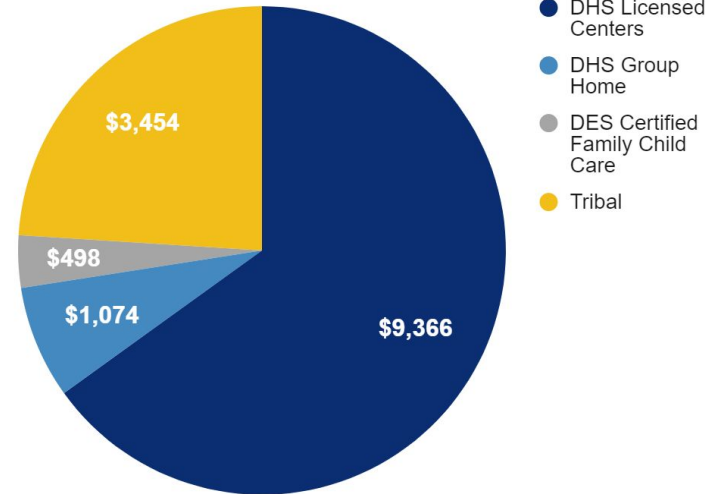

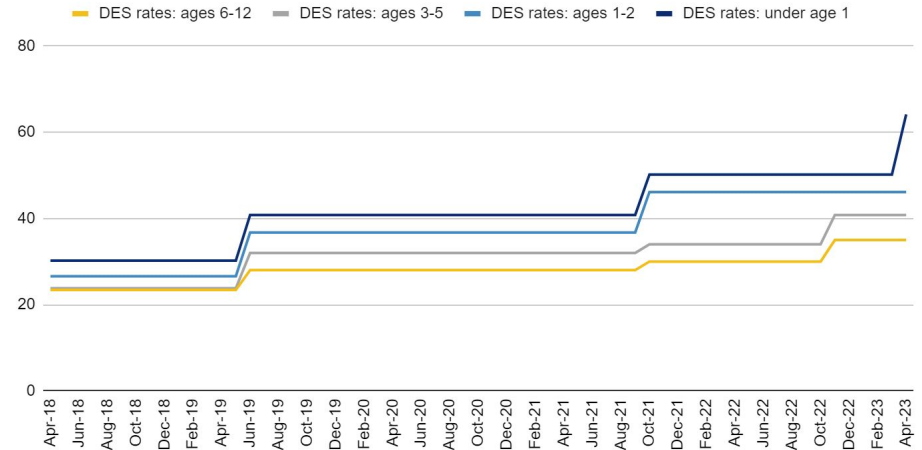

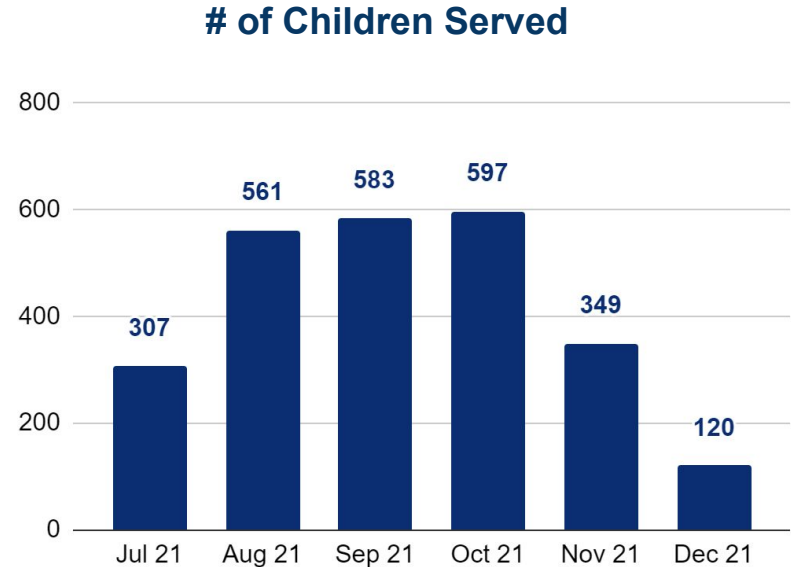

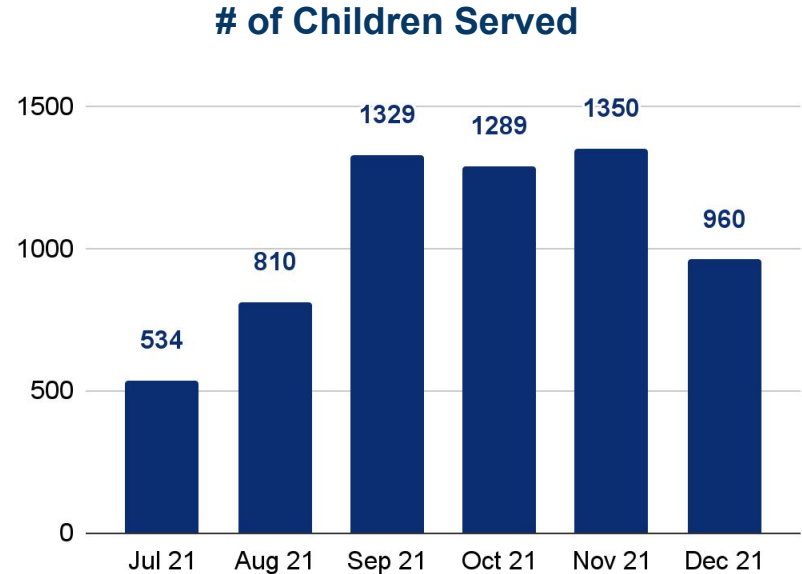

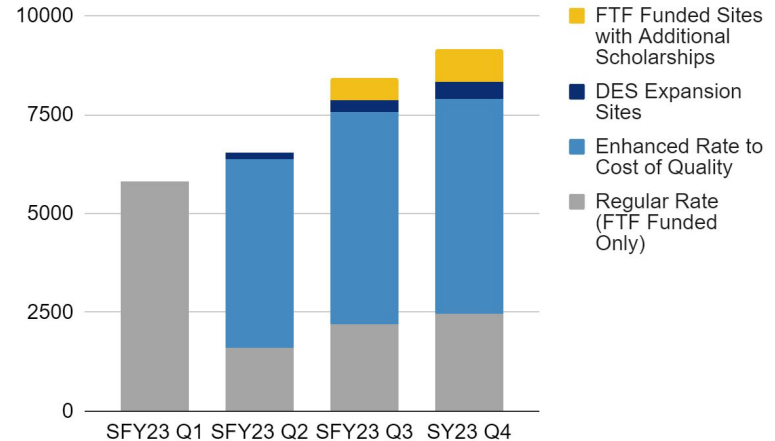

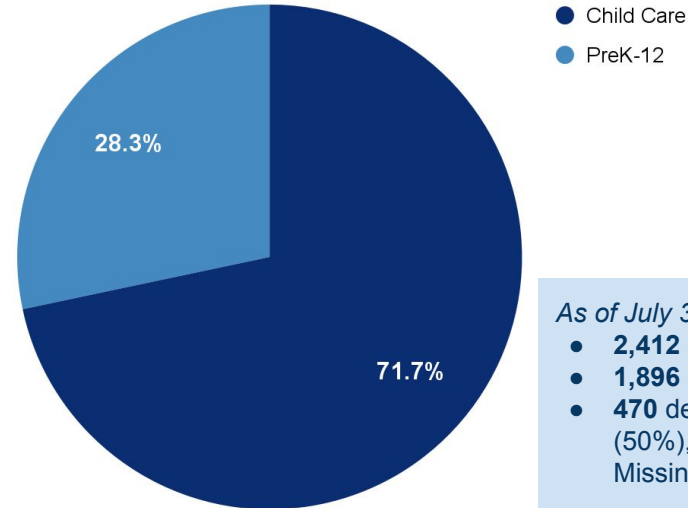

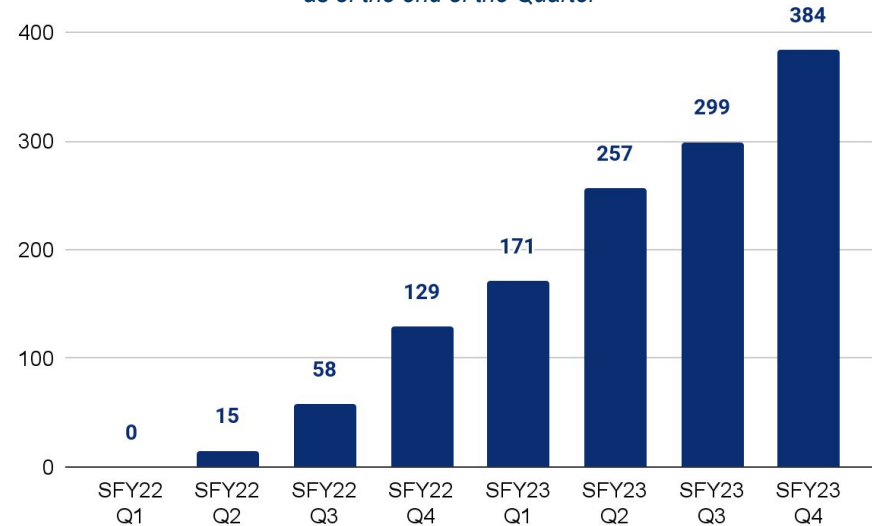

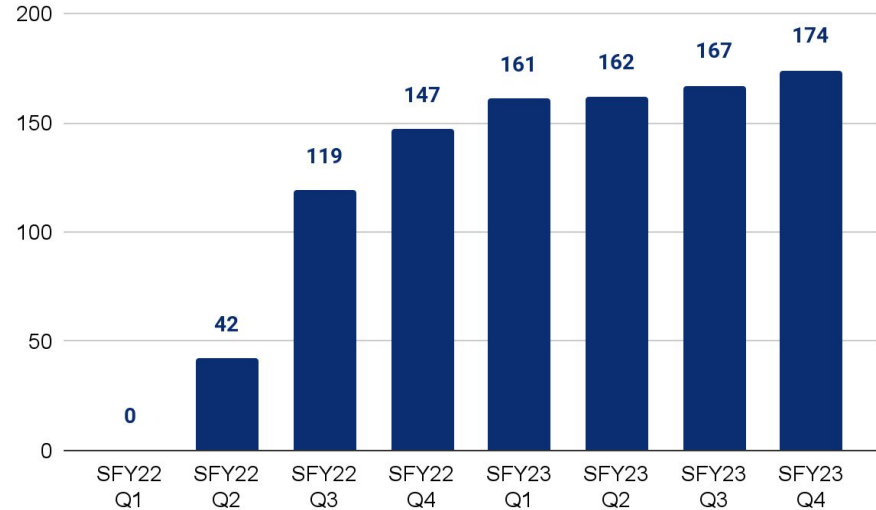

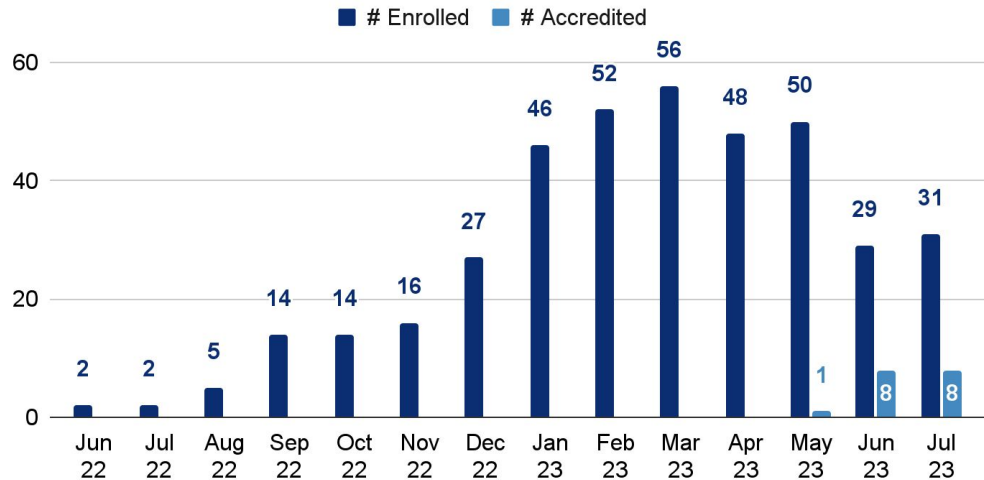

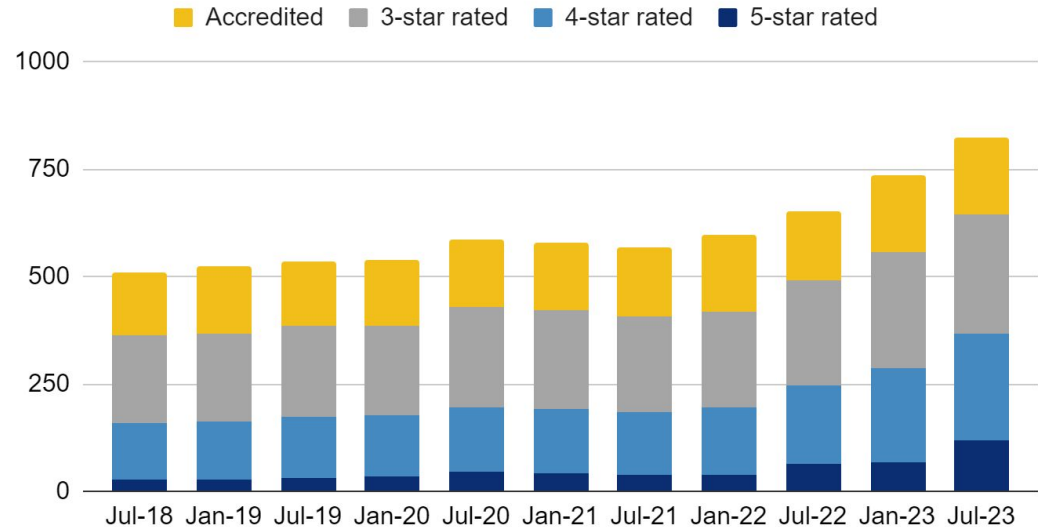

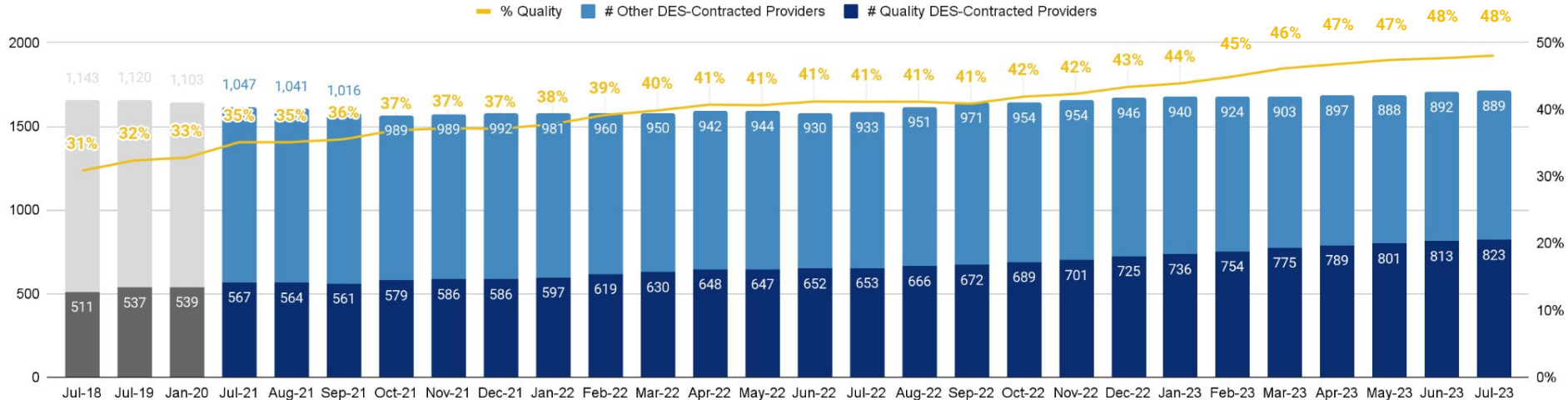

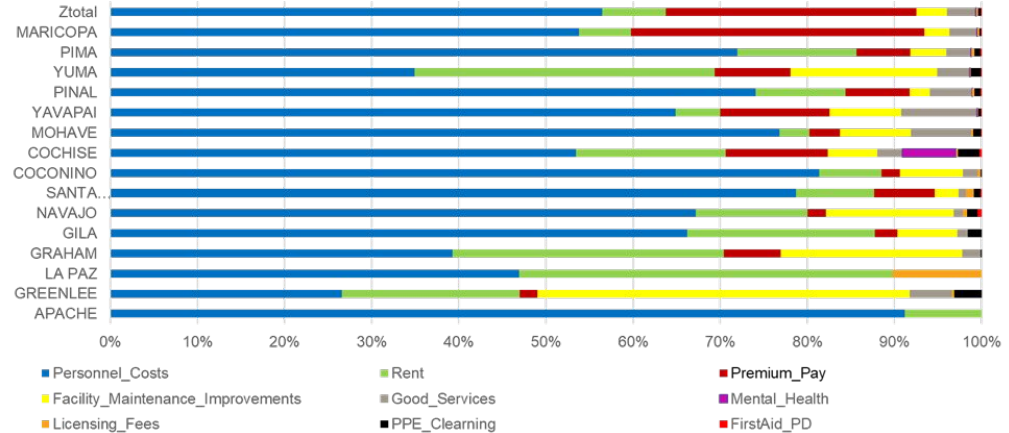

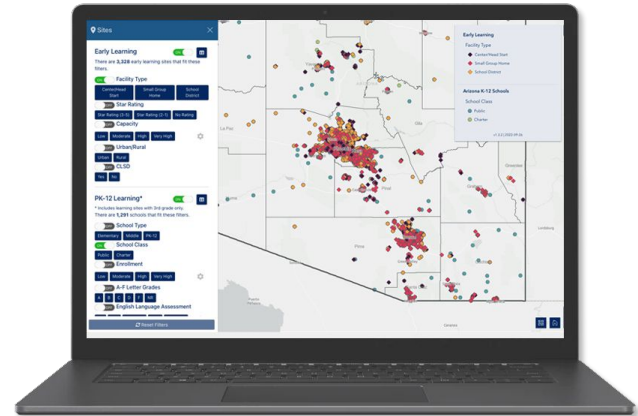

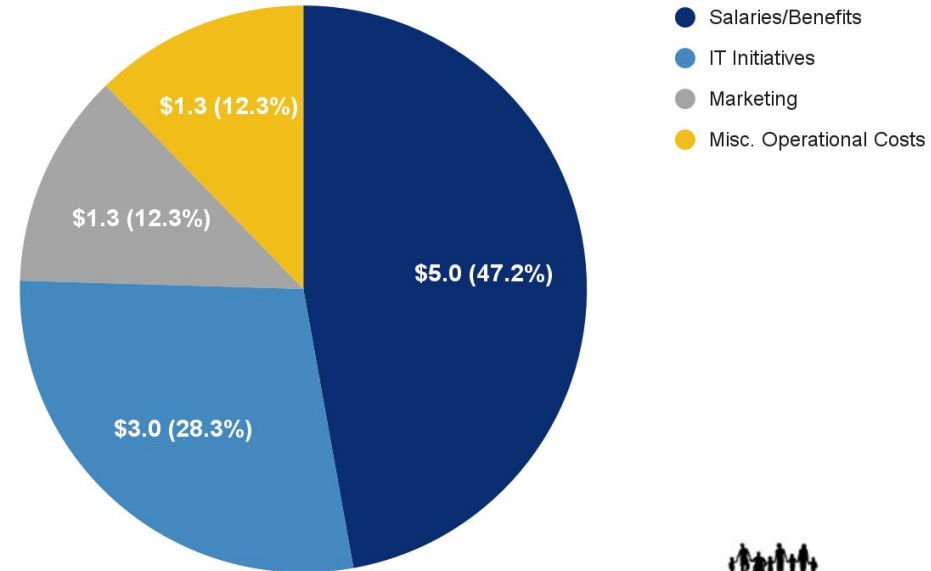

 - ◆ 60% of inquiries were for DES Child Care Assistance or across more than one category (1044/1734)

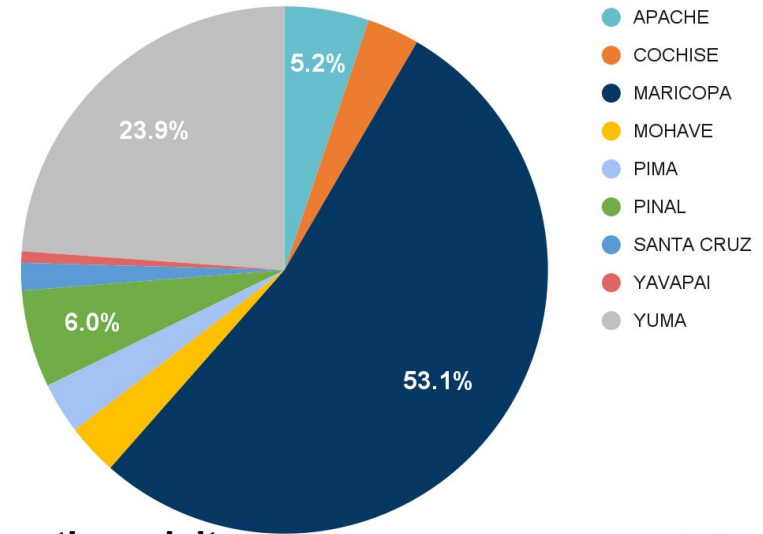

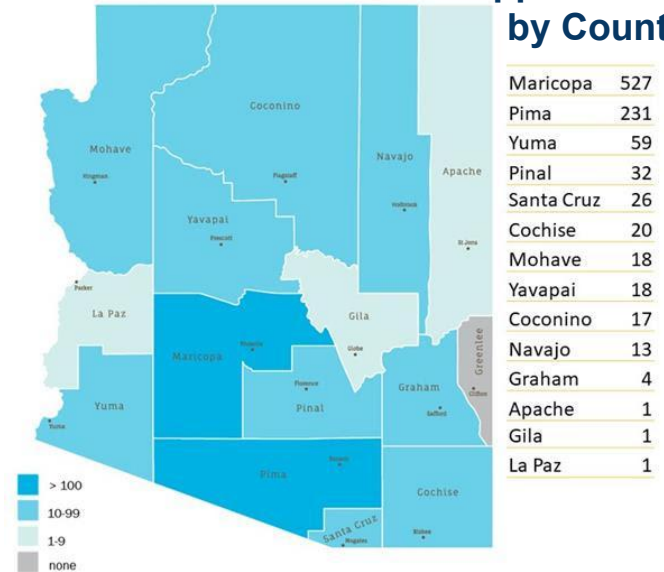
