


# Division of Aging and Adult Services

#### **Older Americans Act**



#### **State Unit on Aging**

The OAA requires a State Unit on Aging (SUA) to administer the OAA funded programs and services and ensures that services are provided based on the target populations:

- low income
- rural
- underserved populations in urban areas
- individuals with severe disabilities and
- individuals with neurological disorders

The SUA advocates for **any** individual living in residential facilities and investigates *Resident Rights* complaints and violations.

#### **Area Agencies on Aging**

Support for Care Recipients or individuals over the age of 60:

- Case Management to help facilitate eligibility for services
- Non-medical home and community based services (NMHCBS)
- Older adults over 60 may be eligible for legal assistance
- Medicare-eligible older adults (65+) may receive health benefits options counseling and access to scam awareness
- Any individual residing in an assisted living facility or skilled nursing facility may contact the Long-Term Care Ombudsman to file complaints and to help resolve Resident Rights violations

The Area Agencies on Aging will conduct an assessment of the care recipient and authorize services.

#### **AAA Family Caregiver Support**

#### The National Family Caregiver Support Program offers:

- 1. information to caregivers about available services
- 2. assistance to caregivers in gaining access to the services
- 3. individual counseling, organization of support groups, and caregiver training
- 4. respite care; and
- 5. supplemental services, on a limited basis

AAAs **case manage** the Care Recipient and the family caregiver for respite care services, supplemental services, and guidance counseling and supportive interventions.

#### Lifespan Respite Care Program

- Arizona Department of Economic Security (ADES), Division of Aging and Adult Services (DAAS) received the Lifespan Respite Grant by the Administration for Community Living:
- First grant award: 2009 2014
- Second grant award: 2012 2014
- Key Deliverables of grant:
  - Development of Caregiver Assessment Tool
  - Public Awareness Campaign
  - Statewide Caregiver Resource Line for Caregivers

# **Respite Care**

#### Caregiver Resource Line

- ADES DAAS launched the Caregiver Resource Line (CRL) to help identify and coordinate respite care services
  - ADES partnered with the Arizona Caregiver Coalition
  - CRL went live statewide August 2012
  - Offers streamlined statewide access to information about resources for family caregivers
  - Trained Caregiver Resource Specialists

#### Goal One: National Strategies Alignment

2022 National Strategy to Support Family Caregivers:

**Goal One:** Achieving greater awareness of and outreach to family caregivers

- Promote public awareness about respite
- Caregiver self-identification helped drive program awareness
- The CRL remains a key component of respite care options, caregiver resource information, and referrals

#### Goal Two: National Strategies Alignment

**Goal Two:** Advancing partnerships and engagement with family caregivers

- Engaging with stakeholders helped to identify gaps in services for caregivers and/or care recipients that were ineligible for other respite care programs
- Increase Arizona Respite Network and collaborations
- Identify service gaps to help create and monitor new respite services
  - Emergency Respite
  - Social Day Clubs

#### Goal Three: National Strategies Alignment

**Goal Three:** Strengthening services and supports for family caregivers.

- Respite Advisory Committee developed a work plan to address gaps in respite care services including emergency respite, overnight respite, limited consumer - directed care models and weekend respite care options
- Working collaboratively with Aging Network to develop emergency definitions, process, payment, and services delivery
- Community Based Organization Mini-Grants launched and is currently accepting applications.

#### Goal Four: National Strategies Alignment

Goal Four: Improving financial and workplace security for family caregivers

- Increasing outreach to public and private sectors to reach family caregivers
- Expanding outreach to the Industrial Commission of Arizona (AZ Dept. of Labor)
- Developing a Resource Guide for Employers using the State of New York and Colorado as a template
- Providing information about the Community-Based Organization Mini-Grants to increase visibility of respite programs

#### Goal Five: National Strategies Alignment

**Goal Five:** More data, research, and evidence-based practices to support family caregivers.

- The SUA is working with Arizona State University to complete a CAT analysis
- AAAs and the ACC use the Division of Aging and Adult Reporting System (DAARS) to input client demographics and the assessment
- Increase efforts apply for other grants to sustain lifespan respite programs
- Increase advocacy efforts for funding

Goal V	Outcome 5:1 A state infrastructure will exist to support the collection of population-based data, using standardized wording of the definition of family caregiving, and standardized working of questions that address the core characteristics of the family caregiving experience.
