- Virtual case management (support coordination) visits for ALTCS members.
- Reimbursement for parents offering direct care to minor children.
- Virtual supervisory visits of Direct Care Workers.
- Home delivered meals.

COVID-19 Updates

American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) of 2021

Increased Federal dollar match to support eligible services. AHCCCS submitted their proposal to CMS on July 12, 2021. 12, 2021.


COVID-19 Updates

 - New services to keep people in their own home or community setting


COVID-19 Member Positive Tests

Member Positive Cases - Own/Family Home & Licensed Facilities




COVID-19 Member Mortality

COVID-19 Vaccine

Eligibility

- Arizonans 5 years of age and older can receive the Pfizer vaccine.
- Arizonans 18 years of age and older can receive either the Pfizer, Moderna, or Johnson & Johnson vaccine.
- Arizonans who are moderately or severely immunocompromised should get an additional primary dose 28 days after the second dose if they received either the Pfizer or Moderna vaccine.

COVID-19 Vaccine

Booster Shots

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends booster shots for the following groups:

- Arizonans 12 years and older who received the second dose of the Pfizer vaccine at least 5 months ago should get the booster.
- Arizonans 18 years and older who received the second dose of the Moderna vaccine at least 6 months ago.
- Arizonans 18 years and older who received the Johnson & Johnson vaccine at least 2 months ago.

Individuals 18 years and older are not required to get the same brand they received for their initial vaccine. Either the **Moderna** or **Pfizer** booster will have the desired effect of boosting the individual's immune system against COVID-19.


Individuals aged 12-17 who received the second dose of the Pfizer vaccine at least 5 months ago can only get the Pfizer booster vaccine.

COVID-19 Vaccine

As of January 6, the Department of Health Services reported that 70.1% of eligible Arizonans are fully vaccinated while 53.3% of eligible DDD members are fully vaccinated.

National Core Indicators (NCI)

National Core Indicators (NCI) is an effort between the National Association of State Directors of Developmental Disabilities Services (NASDDDS) and the Human Services Research Institute (HSRI).

NCI uses in-person interviews and surveys to measure member satisfaction.

- In-Person interviews are facilitated by a graduate of the AZ Partners in Leadership program from Pilot Parents of Southern Arizona. Selected members will be notified by their Support Coordinator.
- Families selected to participate in one of the three surveys will receive them by mail.

Participation is not required but it is encouraged.

DDD only receives a final report from NCI, not personal data from each survey.

10/1/2019 DDD Contracted Health Plan Integration

Since October 1, 2019, the Division (DDD) has contracted with two health plans to provide physical and behavioral health services and Children's Rehabilitative Services to DDD and Arizona Long Term Care Services (ALTCS) eligible members residing across every Arizona county.

These two contracted health plan options are:

- UnitedHealthcare Community Plan
- Mercy Care Plan





DDD Tribal Health Program (Previously called the DDD American Indian Health Plan)

The Division also collaborates with AHCCCS in the administration of a third option, the Tribal Health Program (THP) for American Indian or Alaska Native children and adults with a tribal affiliation.

Tribal members enrolled in the Division who are ALTCS eligible may select the DDD Tribal Health Program or choose a DDD Health Plan provided by Mercy Care or UnitedHealthcare Community Plan.


Meeting the Behavioral Health Needs of DDD Members With Cognitive/Language Support Needs





Applied Behavior Analysis Source: Behavior Analyst Certification Board

Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) is best known for its success in supporting individuals with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) and other developmental disabilities (e.g., Down syndrome, intellectual disabilities).

Intervention in this area is effective across an individual's lifespan (i.e., childhood, adolescence, adulthood). In young children with developmental disabilities such as autism spectrum disorder (ASD), the goal of intensive, comprehensive intervention is to improve cognitive, language, social, and self-help skills.

When supporting adults, applied behavioral analysis (ABA) involves teaching behaviors essential to functioning effectively in the home, school, and community. ABA can also decrease severe problem behaviors that endanger health and safety, and limit educational, residential, or vocational options.

Additional Service Considerations

Additional Behavioral Health Services the Child & Family Team (CFT)/Adult Recovery Team (ART) Might Consider for Members with Cognitive/Language Support Needs Include:

- Counseling to teach coping strategies such as breathing exercises and identify hobbies, interests, skills, and meaningful daily activities
- Peer Support



Arizona Warm Lines – Peer Support

Peer support specialists can relate to behavioral health situations because many have been through similar experiences. Peers offer peer support and compassion for callers who just need someone to talk with.

Additional Service Considerations

Art Therapy enriches the lives of individuals, families, and communities through active art-making, and creative processes.

Art Therapy is used to improve cognitive and sensory-motor functions, foster self-esteem and self-awareness, cultivate emotional resilience, promote insight, enhance social skills, reduce and resolve conflicts and distress.



Additional Service Considerations

Play Therapy seeks to empower individuals by using their own imagination and natural creativity to promote healing and growth.



Play is recognized as one of the most natural modes of learning and interacting with others. It is through play that individuals often express their feelings, explore themselves and their relationships, and attempt to understand their experiences. Individuals may be able to transfer their anxieties, fears, and guilt through toys.

Services Available to Support Families

- Family Counseling is a covered service for individuals who have an DDD or AHCCCS health plan. This can be provided with or without the Member present. This service is available to support the family with issues related to the member's needs, e.g. stress, grief, adapting to new transitions in life, and identifying new solutions to challenges.
- Family Support Specialists have "lived experience" and are available to assist the family.

Substance Use Treatment

- Substance Use is not as common for DDD members as it is in other populations, but does occur.
- Substance Use can bring additional risk to an individual's life. Opiate use in particular presents a high risk of accidental overdose (abuse of opiate pain medication, fentanyl, counterfeit pills bought from non-medical sources, heroin).
- It is important to discuss any concerns regarding substance use with the Support Coordinator and ask the Behavioral Health Complex Care Specialist to be invited to planning meetings. The BH Complex Care Specialist has received training on substance use and how to find local treatment providers.

Arizona's Crisis Services

Arizona has a robust behavioral health crisis services network available to any Arizona resident regardless of health insurance coverage.

Services include:

- 24/7/365 crisis telephone lines operated by trained crisis specialists.
- 24/7 mobile teams staffed by behavioral health professionals who travel to the individual experiencing a crisis and provide assessment, stabilization and may triage the individual to a higher level of care, as appropriate.
- Facility-based crisis stabilization centers that offer crisis stabilization and observation, including access to Medication Assisted Treatment.
