1. Describe how your entity's existing mission, policies, or commitments ensure equitable access to, and equitable participation in, the proposed project or activity.

Arizona EI Program (AzEIP)'s <u>Policy Manual</u> supports a commitment to equitable access by requiring the program implement a child find system that ensures all potentially eligible children are identified, located, and evaluated, including specified demographics that are most at risk of being underserved (Policy Manual 1.7.1 and 1.1.2.E-F). The policy also describes how this effort must be coordinated with other local entities that support Part C services in the state, including special education, maternal health, screening, referral, child safety, and Head Start programs.

2. Based on your proposed project or activity, what barriers may impede equitable access and participation of students, educators, or other beneficiaries?

Arizona continues to address challenges with remote/rural locations, including tribal, military, and religious communities with cultural barriers, poverty, distance, and technology limitations. These barriers can potentially impact referral rates, access to services, and receiving adequate levels and quality of services.

3. Based on the barriers identified, what steps will you take to address such barriers to equitable access and participation in the proposed project or activity?

As indicated in AzEIP's SSIP, a review of existing Family Outcomes survey data for representativeness by race, ethnicity, and geographical region is in process. To improve representativeness and ensure a clear picture, analysis by survey question and identification of potential concerns is completed and a plan to address identified concerns is developed. Current strategies include program monitoring, regular technical assistance and training, and a contracted deep-dive equity study with Arizona State University's (ASU) Children's Equity Project.

AzEIP engaged with stakeholders in 2021 for feedback on potential ARPA funding projects. Addressing Child Find/equity was one of the priorities identified which resulted in AzEIP contracting with ASU to conduct a study of underserved communities and compile additional demographic data to measure how effective AzEIP current policies and procedures are at providing equitable access to EI services. The report will identify gaps and make recommendations on strategies to strengthen AzEIP's capacity to reach all children and families in need of services. AzEIP has also recently hired a Tribal Relations Liaison position to support engagement and access efforts with tribal communities.

4. What is your timeline, including targeted milestones, for addressing these identified barriers?

The ASU study will conclude by March 31, 2024, at which time AzEIP will use the report metrics and recommendations to formulate a plan with specific actions, milestones and timelines to enhance and build upon current activities that address gaps in equitable access to EI services.
